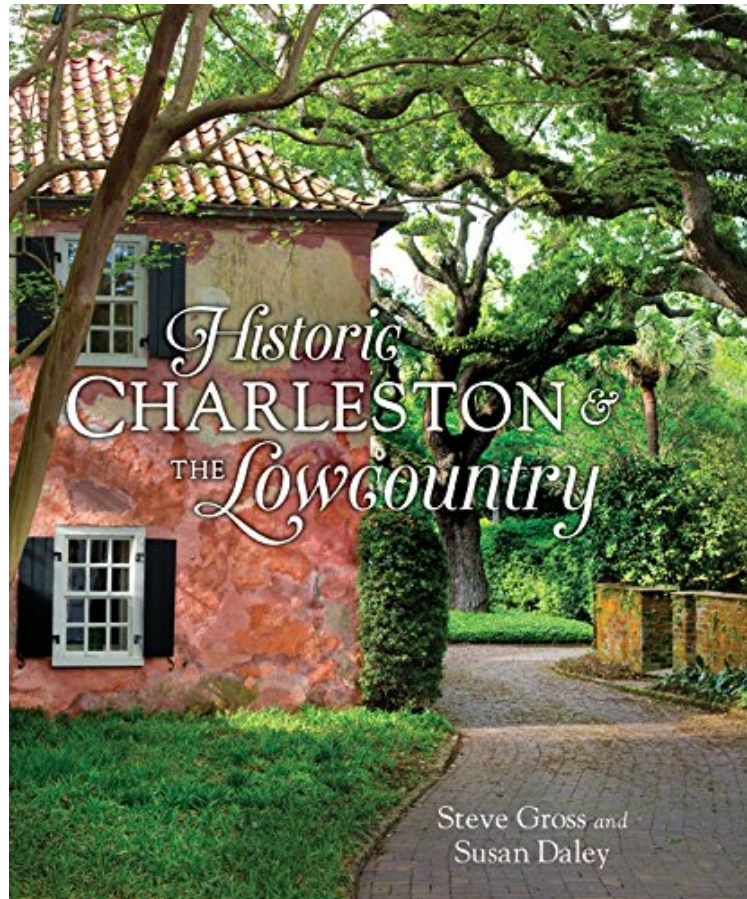

Despite some well-written chapters at the front of the book describing some unique features of Charleston architecture (such as wrought iron, churches, gardens, etc...), this book is, without question, about the photography. As such, you really need to buy the hardcover edition of the book and steer well clear of the e-book. The selection of sites is, as you would expect, far from comprehensive, but is a lovely representative sample of important structures nonetheless. The photography is a nearly perfect balance of exterior, interior, and detail shots that form a beautiful and engaging photo essay. My gauge for books like this is if I can truly get the feeling for a place while browsing, and this book delivers. You're immersed in Charleston. It works. The framing text is minimal, giving only the most summary historical contexts to help understand the life of the structures. One of the things I learned about some of the houses in

Charleston is that quite a few of the outbuildings at a given homesite may actually predate the primary structure itself. I had never thought of that before and, in fact, the building on the cover of the book is one such structure. The book is not intended to be an academic study or a tool for practicing professionals.
