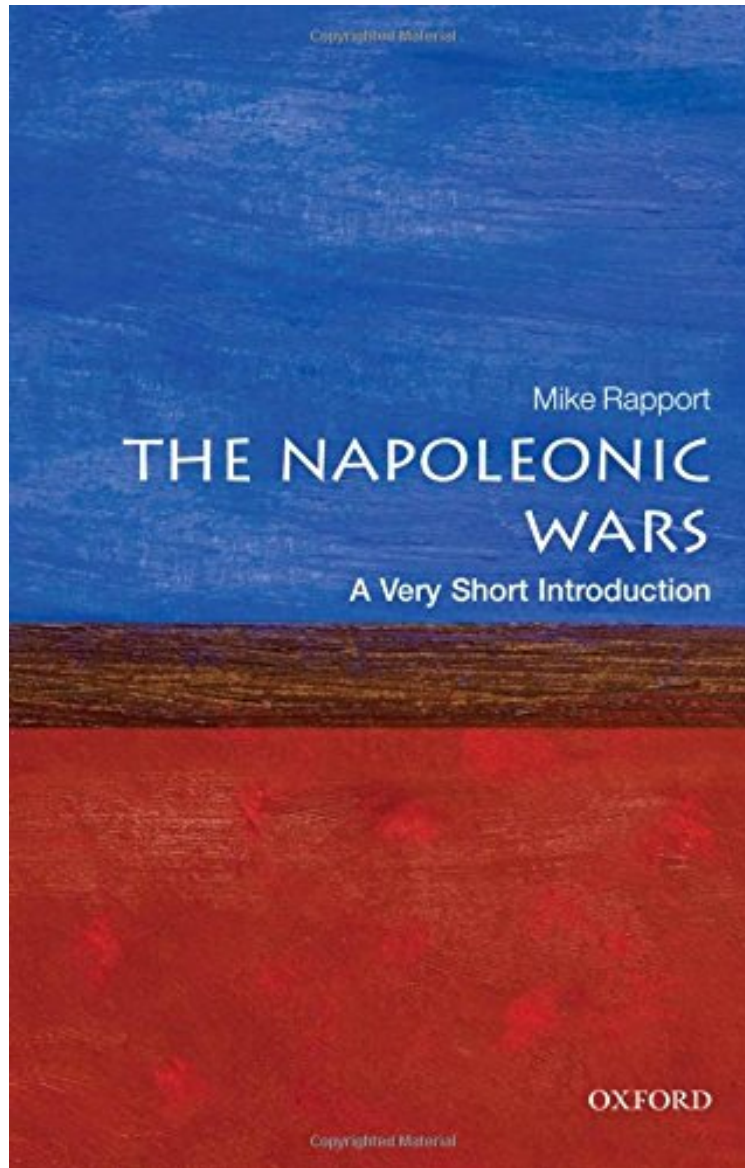

judicious, well-written book provides a very good summary of the entire 1789-1815 period of European History (not just the later part dominated by Napoleon) Its main emphasis is on the complex political history of the period, with lesser attention to economic, social, and military history. It can serve well to refresh the memories of those who have studied the period before, to help to integrate and set in context accounts of particular parts of the overall story, or provide an attractive introduction. The Further Reading section at the back is an excellent introduction to many of the best books on the period and its individual aspects. The lack of maps is an unfortunate omission, particularly for those relying on it as an introduction. It would have been better to leave out the illustrations (few of which contribute much) and replace them with a few well-selected maps.

By Ray I very much enjoyed reading this very short introduction to the Napoleonic Wars. The book's title is SLIGHTLY deceptive in that it also covers the Revolutionary Wars that preceded the Napoleonic Wars, but that is splitting hairs. The book is well written, and although it indeed helps if you are familiar with the French Revolution's particulars, it isn't absolutely necessary due to the orientation piece at the front part of the work. It is well written, both clearly and logically laid out. The book does not emphasize details of various battles, but being an overview, weaves the story of the various wars (and there were plenty of them) that immediately followed the French Revolution, and how those wars eventually reshaped the political and cultural landscape of Europe by about the third decade of the 19th century. I can highly recommend it as one of the very well done "Very Short Introductions" (I've read about ten to twenty of them at this point), and if you are interested in French history, it's a must. Finally, he illuminates the significance of the wars, and their legacy, in both specific national contexts and from a wider global perspective.
